

Appalachian Futures is a look at how people in our region envision a better future for themselves, their communities, and their environment. By thinking about the issues that occupy discussions of Appalachian identity through the eyes of its scholars, writers, workers, and artists, Appalachian Futures wants you to think, "How can optimism about the diversity of our region, our industry and education, our traditional culture, and our most forward-looking arts help us make for better lives?"

Appalachian Futures addresses popular narratives about Appalachia in a new way. We present the people of Appalachia who are working to rewrite their own stories beyond limiting definitions of what it means to be in these mountains, and present those stories through scholarly research, art, and civic action. You might find yourself asking:

How diverse is Appalachia? How do different ways of being affect our outlook on our region's way forward?

What is the relationship between industry, technology and our natural environment in a healthy future?

What forms of education and other literacies can we draw upon to move from a difficult economic past to a more prosperous future?

How can our traditions from the past frame a distinctly Appalachian future?

How can the wildest visions of Appalachia help us expand our sense of what is possible?

These questions might lead to big ideas, bold dreams, or wild visions. They might even lead us collectively to a better Appalachian Future.

Appalachian Futures is the second annual collaborative, multidisciplinary exhibit exploring key issues in our region, produced by the WVU Libraries' Art in the Libraries program.
