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
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


EVANSDALE LIBRARY


Evansdale Campus is home to an array of colleges including Creative Arts, Engineering, Agricultural Sciences as well as the Evansdale Library. The Evansdale Library hosted several exhibitions that celebrate campus scholars and artists as well as unique displays of faculty and staff personal collections of items such as toys, dishware, and tools. For example, in 2021, WVU Facilities staff member Bradley Hart exhibited his KISS memorabilia. In 2021, fashion design students showed and presented about their designs. In 2017, art student Patrick Bayly shared his paintings with the Evansdale Library. Throughout the years 2017-19, science and art students collaborated to create sculptures that were installed at Evansdale Library. The Art in the Libraries programming at Evansdale Library has enriched the faculty, staff, students, and public experience.

Community Engagement in Science Through Art 2017-2019

A WVU National Science Foundation grant brought together select teams of sculpture, chemistry, and engineering students from across the country for four fast-paced summers. The teams brainstormed, designed, and built artistic representations of scientific concepts in just four weeks. Librarians provided input on the design and guided students on tackling public safety concerns. The resulting artworks were robust, maintenance-free constructions displayed at Evansdale Library. The resulting three displays attracted viewers throughout the following years.


Displays have also featured popular culture collections, including KISS memorabilia, childhood toys, games, and promotional model cars. A vintage film display featured 8mm films, projectors, and other film-related objects, mostly horror, filled the cases. Also, a typewriter collection recalled the days before the computer.


