OTHER INITIATIVES



The Art in the Libraries program has developed several other campus and community initiatives, such as the first ever Morgantown Public Art Guide, a Campus Art Crawl, and the Inclusive Portrait Project. Another project was developing Virtual Art Offerings of online exhibits, virtual tours and recorded programs. We have also crowd-sourced some playful exhibitions such as a coloring exhibit, a *Looking at Morgantown* photography exhibit and *REMIXing* the archives exhibit. We have hosted a series of photography exhibits by staff and faculty, such as Michael Sherwin's *WVU's Jackson Hole Photography Workshop: Ten Years in the Making*, documenting his student trips to Wyoming.
