SUPREME COURT RULES AMENDED

The amended rules of practice in the Supreme Court of Appeals have been published. Among the changes are the following:

Oral presentations on applications for writs of error and appeals during term time will be heard only in open court. The Court sits on Tuesdays.

Certified cases under the new law are first examined by the Court and are to be accompanied by typewritten briefs of counsel; if docketed for hearing such cases will be submitted without a formal request of the parties.

The deposits for printing records in appeal cases are to be made or the records printed within three months after the appeals are docketed.

Notice to confess error must be filed in Clerk's office ten days before the return day of such notice.

Original papers or transcripts must be fully indexed and a certificate affixed by Circuit Clerk that deposit was made or bond given for preliminary costs, before consideration will be given to application.

Printed copies of the three reports which have been issued by The American Law Institute are now available for general consideration. These will be kept in stock by Clerk William B. Matthews, Charleston; members of the Association, and others sending in one dollar, may obtain copies of them, see the form of the work and offer (as we are urgently asked to do) any suggestions for improvement in the language or substance of the reports. Mr. W. D. Lewis, director of the American Law Institute, requests that many members of the Association avail themselves of this opportunity, not only to see what the Institute is doing, but to help in the work.
